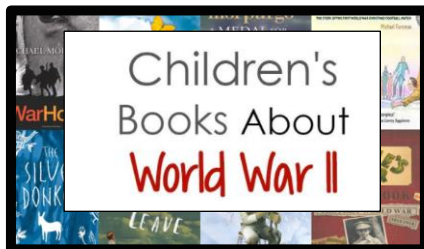

Etymology:

mid-15c., *posthumus*, "born after the death of the originator" (author or father), from Late Latin *posthumus*, from Latin *postumus* "last," especially "last-born"

Definition:

- 1: born after the death of the father
- 2: published after the death of the author
- 3: following or occurring after death *posthumous* fame
